Answer: INCONSPICUOUS

Nice with jam and bread (3)	TEA

The answers form pairs wherein the length of one word is n and the length of the other word is $2n + 1$. In each pair, the longer word is anagram of the shorter word with each letter used twice, plus one extra letter. Taken in the order in which the short words occur, these pairings are:

TEA → ACETATE	extra letter is C
ENACT → CONCATENATE.....	extra letter is O
RACIST → CARICATURISTS	extra letter is U
LATTE → TATTLETALES.....	extra letter is S
RANG → ARRANGING	extra letter is I
GAIT → AGITATING	extra letter is N
ION → OPINION	extra letter is P
SENSES → SENSELESSNESS	extra letter is L
SERF → SUFFERERS	extra letter is U
APE → APPEASE	extra letter is S
SET → SEPTETS.....	extra letter is P

The extra letters spell out COUSIN PLUS P.

You must now reuse the double-anagram-plus-one-letter mechanism. In this case, that means doubling the letters in COUSIN, adding the letter P, and anagramming. The result is the final answer, INCONSPICUOUS.
